The Partnership was created this year by the merger of the Saginaw Bay Watershed Council, an organization of local governments, and the Saginaw Basin Alliance, a citizens' group. The Partnership now includes representatives of a broad array of grass roots interests.

By virtue of your membership in the Watershed Council, your governmental unit will remain a member in good standing of the Partnership through calendar 1995. I ask that you act soon to renew your membership for 1996. This renewal will reflect several changes from the previous situation.

Due to the availability of financial support from the state and federal governments, membership in the Watershed Council was offered free to any local unit of government in the watershed. 

WHAT IS THE SAGINAW BAY WATERSHED?

The Saginaw Bay Watershed represents one of Michigan's most unique regions. Consisting of the entire land area and waterways that drain into the Saginaw Bay, the area is home to 1.4 million people and covers 8,700 square miles. In addition, the Watershed's 22 counties contain over 7,000 miles of rivers and streams. Agriculture, heavy manufacturing, tourism and outdoor recreation are all leading industries, and are all fundamentally dependent upon access to abundant supplies of fresh water.



The Saginaw Bay Watershed, however, is not healthy. The Saginaw River and Bay have been designated an "Area of Concern" by the International Joint Commission on the basis of contaminated sediments, fish consumption advisories, degraded fisheries and loss of significant habitat and recreational values. Other environmental quality problems in the watershed relate to land management practices, erosion, toxic contamination, and others.

Who is THE PARTNERSHIP?

The Partnership for the Saginaw Bay Watershed was established through the merger of the Saginaw Bay Watershed Council and the Saginaw Basin Alliance. With the mission of facilitating public and private cooperation for the wise use of watershed resources, the Partnership provides education, advocacy, and monitoring activities for the residents of the Saginaw Bay Watershed. As an association of citizens, environmental educators, business representatives,

agricultural producers, local governments and others, the Partnership conducts and promotes activities to protect and restore the ecological integrity of the Saginaw Basin.









Established as a non-profit agency, the Partnership supports wise resource management through education, advocacy, and monitoring, to ensure regional economic viability and high quality use by future generations.
